RE: Integrated Studies classes taken by Mike Stuart in 1978-79

Please accept I.S. 1B "Genetics" for 4 units of Natural Sciences Breadth Requirement credit. Description follows:

This course will cover the social, health and historical aspects of genetics. Enough elementary genetics will be covered so that students can read material with comprehension. Topics include: Eugenics Movements, Recombinant DNA, Cloning, Radiation, Human Genetic Diseases, Ethics of Genetic Counseling and Prenatal Diagnosis.

Please accept I.S. 1D "Anthropology" for 4 units of Social Sciences Breadth Requirement credit. Description follows:

This course will introduce students to the basic aims and methods of social and cultural anthropology, and attempt to give them an understanding of (1) traditions in human groups and their transmission from generation to generation (in Western and non-Western parts of the world); (2) the different kinds of revolutions with which anthropologists are concerned; and (3) some of the social structural aspects of modern society.

Please accept I.S. 28 "Theology" for 4 units of Humanities Breadth Requirement credit. Description follows:

This course is concerned with three problems: first, the question of whether a god exists, and if so, his nature; second, the question of the nature of man and man's place in the universe; and lastly, the role of morality in society. The major goal of the class is to help the student decide what he or she thinks about each of these problems. Readings are from Eastern as well as Western religious traditions.

Dear I.S. Student,

Welcome to the class of 84-85. You are the largest and most diverse class we have admitted. (See attached list of classmates) All of the faculty are looking forward to welcoming you to our first event of the school year, an Ice Cream Social on Monday night, September 17, from 7:30-9pm in the Tercero Dining Commons to the left of the exit from the food line. We will introduce the faculty and Academic Peer Advisor, give you a little background on the Program, answer questions and then socialize.

Very shortly you will receive Housing Assignments and computer generated Study Lists. 




